COMPASS Placement Testing

What is the COMPASS Placement Test?

- The COMPASS Placement Test is a computerized test that determines where you begin your studies at SSC, and your readiness for college level courses.
- It is important that you do your very best.

Do I Have to Take the COMPASS Placement Test?

- All new students entering college for the first time need to take the Placement Test, unless exempt based on previous college credit or ACT scores.
- Students can only take the Placement Test after they have completed an Admission application.
- Students must wait 24 hours after completing the Admission application before they are

Where do I take the COMPASS Placement Test?

- The COMPASS Placement Test is given in The Assessment Center, located on the second floor of the main campus in room 2266.
- No appointment is needed. Walk-in testing is available Monday through Thursday

between 8:30 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., and Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Last start time to test is 4:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 1:00 p.m. on Fridays to ensure adequate time to complete testing.

What ACT scores will I need to be exempt from COMPASS Placement Testing?

- Your ACT scores in Reading, Writing and Math may exempt you from taking the COMPASS Placement Test.
- Use the table on the next page to determine whether a combination of your ACT scores and your high school grades will exempt you from taking one or more parts of the COMPASS Placement Test.
- If you believe you should be exempt from taking one or more parts of the COMPASS Placement Test based upon your ACT scores, you must make an appointment to see a counselor to waive the appropriate part of the test.
- NOTE: Reading & Math ACT scores are good for placement 3 years from date of test. English ACT scores are good for placement 2 years from date of test.

- The results will determine if you are college ready or developmental courses are required.
- Developmental courses will add time and money to earning a degree or certificate.

What areas will I be tested on?

- The COMPASS Placement Test consists of three sections: English, Reading and Math.
- You may take the complete test in one day, or break the testing areas up over multiple days.
- Students will start with the Math section of the Placement Test.

How does the COMPASS Placement Test work?

• It is important to understand that the COMPASS Test is "adaptive" to how you answer the given questions. Depending on the number of correct or incorrect answers, the test will move up or down adjusting to your answers.

Should I study for the COMPASS Placement Test?

- Yes. Preparation can save you time and money.
- The COMPASS Placement Test determines whether or not you can take college-level courses, or if you need to complete developmental courses before taking college-level coursework. Preparing yourself for the COMPASS Placement Test by reviewing and taking practice tests can save you time and money.
- Based on your placement scores, there are up to three levels of English, three levels of Reading, and five levels of Developmental Math courses that may be required.

- Each developmental course you place into will cost you extra time and money to complete and also uses up your financial aid eligibility.
- It is important that you are prepared in order to place in the highest level possible.

Guide to Successful Placement Testing

- 1. You must wait 24 hours from the time you complete the Admission application before you can test in order to review.
- 2. You will be given review materials to help you improve your placement.
- 3. There are several ways to accomplish this:
 - Access the ACT COMPASS website for sample questions.
 - A. Go to www.act.org/compass/tests
 - B. On the COMPASS Tests page, you can now click on each test, Reading, Writing Skills and Mathematics.
 - C. Once you click on each link for Reading, Writing Skills, and Mathematics on the COMPASS test page, click on the link for "Sample Test Questions" for each area found on that page.
 - D. On the Mathematics test page, you will find links for sample math test questions for numerical skills/pre-algebra and algebra AND college algebra, geometry and trigonometry.
 - E. The correct answers for each set of sample questions are provided at the end of each test.

Additional Math Study Guides are available in Admissions, Testing or Counseling. These purple and orange study guides were developed by the Math department to provide additional math review. Take advantage of these worksheets as this will help increase your recall of problem solving that you may not have practiced in some time.


- 4. On the day of the test, make sure of the following:
 - You have a government issued picture I.D. with you. You cannot test without a picture I.D.
 - You are physically, emotionally and mentally ready to test which means:
 - A. You are not exceptionally tired or hungry.
 - B. You are not feeling sick.
 - C. Your mind is not preoccupied with another important matter.
 - D. You are not in a hurry.
 - E. You have at least three hours to devote to this test.
- 5. Additional Testing may be required.
 - ENGLISH: If you do not score into college-level English on the English portion of the COMPASS exam, you will be required to write an essay.
 - A. Your essay score will determine your placement in either collegelevel English or a developmental English course.

- B. Before beginning the Essay test, carefully read the directions on the front of the writing sample form.
- MATH: If you do not score into Math 095 or higher, you will be required to take a second math test (ALEKS) to determine your math placement.

How the ALEKS Test Works:

- 1. The test will be done completely on a computer.
- 2. You will answer between 25 and 35 questions.
- 3. Questions are NOT multiple choice—you will type in each answer.
- 4. You may use a calculator only if one pops up on the screen.

- A. ALEKS will test your abilities in signed numbers, fractions, decimals and percents.
- B. You will not be able to use a calculator for this portion of the test. Scratch paper and a pencil will be provided for you.
- 5. Be sure that you understand everything you see on the tutorial. Ask a testing staff member if you have a question or don't understand something before you begin the actual test.
- 6. Do not guess—if you have no idea how to solve the problem, click "I don't know."
- 7. Work problems out on paper—do not attempt to answer a question in your head.
