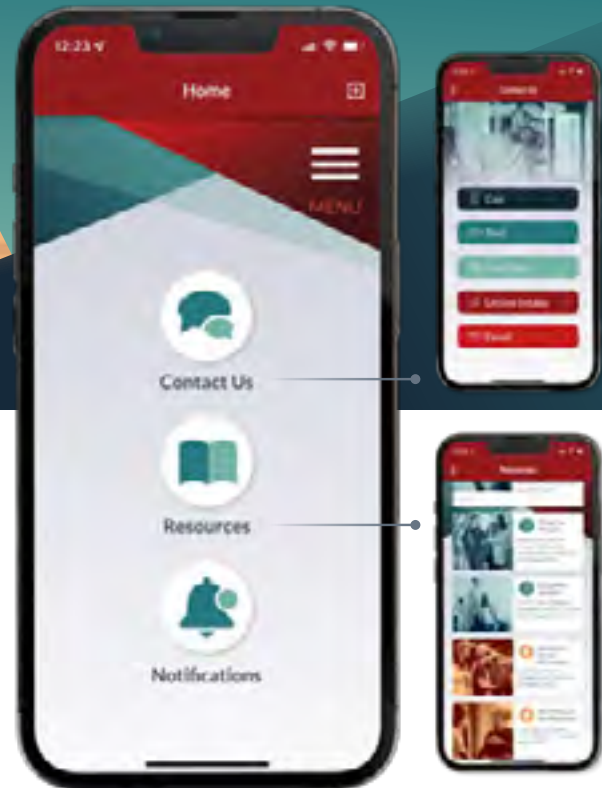

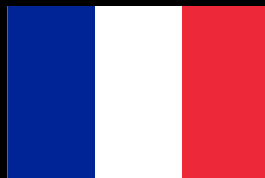

Prompt: "If you could change anything in the world, what would you change?"

What would you do if you had the ability to change the world? If you had one opportunity to change something about the world? Most would use this as a way to make the world a better place, and some would use it for their own personal gain. Of those who want to make the world better, it can be either quite easy or get extremely complicated rather quickly. For some, it's as simple as "world peace," "end world hunger," or "stop poverty." For others, what might seem like a simple question to answer soon becomes a long and arduous task of figuring out what single change could do the most amount of good for the greatest amount of people. This is the line of thought I went down as I pondered the answer to this question. Although an easy answer is tempting, it lacks the substance required to adequately address all the problems present in society. After a while, I finally came to my solution. If I could change anything in the world, I would remove willful ignorance.

To start, let me define what I mean by "willful ignorance." Ignorance is the lack of knowledge or information, and to be willful is to intentionally do as one wants, regardless of the consequences or effects. Therefore, willful ignorance is when someone intentionally disregards or dismisses information in order to do what they want, without regard to consequences it may have. Examples of this are news sites posting and spreading misinformation in order to gain clicks, bigots intentionally ignoring science that disproves their biases, or politicians denying important issues simply because a political opponent brought it up. In essence, willful ignorance is whenever someone intentionally ignores science, data, reality, or even the thoughts and feelings of others just for their own gain.

As to why I'd remove this, of all things, is for three main reasons. The first being that the removal of willful ignorance would create a world with more love and community than ever before. Prejudice, bigotry, and bias are all products of stereotypes formed from lies and misinformation made to promote and spread hate. Without them, people would be forced to accept reality not as it was told to them but how it actually is. No longer will people hate each other for reasons beyond their control. Minorities would receive the same rights and privileges as everyone else.

The second reason is because it would make the world a smarter place. Without misinformation, disinformation, or yellow journalism, people wouldn't be told lies masquerading as the truth. The world wouldn't have politicians elected off their mountains of lies. People would then become more educated, as lies would no longer be headlines or front pages. The news would become much more credible, as personal bias from writers would no longer cloud their judgment.

The final reason is that it could potentially solve all those other proposed changes brought up near the start. Without prejudice and misinformation, countries would become friendlier and more open to peace, which could lead to world peace. With a more loving and caring community and a government that can no longer blatantly lie, poverty and world hunger would surely meet their end. There, I see the beauty in this change. Not only would it accomplish the goal of not one but three other proposed changes, but it would solve much more than just that. That's exactly what I hoped for when brainstorming for this challenge: what one thing, if changed, would make the greatest amount of positive change for society as a whole?

Student Emergency Aid Program

The purpose of the Student Emergency Aid Program is to support SSC students who are experiencing an unexpected event or situation that requires immediate attention and support. Financial support up to \$500 for short-term, nonrecurring emergencies is available. Eligible expenses may include, but are not limited to: utilities, housing/rent, food, medical/dental, transportation and childcare. College expenses such as tuition, fees and books are not eligible.

To apply students must:

- Be currently enrolled at SSC
- Have earned a 2.0 GPA or greater
- Provide documentation of request (payments will be provided to the vendor, not the student)
- If approved, complete a financial literacy course

Note, this is a one-time disbursement during the program.

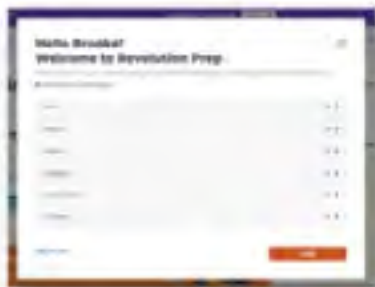

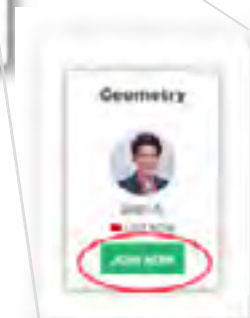
